#### I. Call to Order

Chair Worthley called the Tulare County Local Agency Formation Commission meeting to order at 2:01 p.m.

#### II. Approval of the October 1, 2014 Meeting Minutes:

Upon motion by Commissioner Allen and seconded by Commissioner Hamilton, the Commission unanimously approved the minutes of October 1, 2014.

#### **III. Public Comment Period**

Public Comments opened/closed at 2:02 p.m. There were no public comments.

#### IV. Action Items

#### 1. Annexation to the Orosi Public Utility District (PUD) Case #1508

Staff Analyst Echavarria stated Orosi PUD was proposing to annex approximately one acre of uninhabited land (SR Hwy 63 north of avenue 416). The proposed annexation would allow Orosi PUD to provide water, sewage disposal and street lighting to the subject area. Staff Analyst Echavarria stated Orosi PUD was in compliance with CEQA as they had prepared an initial study/negative declaration for the proposed annexation.

Staff Analyst Echavarria stated that consent to this annexation was received from the affected landowner therefore; the protest proceedings may be waived in accordance with Gov. Code, and requested the Commission to approve the proposal and take action on items 1-7 listed in the staff report.

Chair Worthley opened/closed the Public Comment Session at 2:05 p.m.

Upon motion by Commissioner Hamilton and seconded by Commissioner Allen, the Commission approved the Annexation to the Orosi Public Utility District (PUD) Case # 1508.

#### 2. Amendment to Policy B-2 (Processing Fees)

EO Giuliani stated that the Commission reviewed the draft amendment to Policy B-2 at the last Commission meeting, and reiterated that the amendment was to separate out

the activation of latent powers to a special district as a separate fee, rather than a standard change of the organization fee of \$3,476. EO Giuliani stated this proposal of activation of latent powers fee was \$500 plus any actual costs exceeding \$500.

Upon motion by Commissioner Ishida and seconded by Commissioner Allen, the Commission approved the Amendment to Policy B-2 (Processing Fees).

#### 3. 2015 Proposal Deadline and Meeting Schedule

Ms. Blythe presented the proposed tentative meeting dates and application deadlines for 2015.

Upon motion by Commissioner Allen and seconded by Commissioner Hamilton, the Commission adopted the 2015 Proposal Deadline and Meeting Schedule.

#### VI. Executive Officer's Reports

#### 1. Williamson Act Contract Determination Process

EO Giuliani reviewed the law and processes associated with creating Williamson Act contracts, determining the validity of city protests and the Commission's and cities' responsibilities when land under Williamson Act contract is proposed to be annexed to a city.

The commissioners discussed the fairness of the process and sequence of the process.

#### 2. ESA's 2014-08 through -11 (City of Porterville)

EO Giuliani stated a group of Extraterritorial Service Agreements (ESA) had been received from the City of Porterville, involving single properties with dry wells, and one ESA for the Akin Water Company involving water that didn't meet State safety standards, which had secured grant funding connect to the City of Porterville.

The Commission commented in support of the ESA process and the approved ESAs.

#### 3. Legislative Update

EO Giuliani stated a final legislative update was received from the CALAFCO Annual Conference, which reflected three legislative bills of interest to the commission on page 38 of the staff report - AB 1521 (Fox) - Vehicle License fees would help newly incorporated cities, and SB 69 (Roth) were vetoed by the governor. EO Giuliani stated AB 1527 (Perea), which would have allowed consideration of municipal service reviews for allocations of funding for public water systems, was also vetoed.

Commissioner Allen highlighted legislative bill AB2156 (Achadjian) which provides that LAFCO may request from JPA's information in order to conduct its studies.

#### 4. Upcoming Projects

EO Giuliani provided at the December LAFCO meeting the commission would consider the selection of the Chair and Vice-Chair, the LAFCO's annual report, and the proposed cancelation of the January 2015 LAFCO Meeting and noted that the City alternate position would need to be filled.

#### VII. Correspondence

Chair Worthley acknowledged the thank you letter from CALAFCO as provided in the agenda.

#### **VIII. Other Business**

#### 1. Commissioner Update

Commissioner Allen stated last year CALAFCO celebrated 50 years with Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Act and noted that the Annual Conference theme this year was looking ahead at innovations moving forward. Commissioner Allen highlighted the topics of discussion and the sessions held for water sources, groundwater legislation, and the emphasis for systemic synergistic approach to water management, and demand and supply. Commissioner Allen discussed the roles of JPA's, and how sub basins are defined, mapped, and planned, and that no one had stepped up to establishing governance.

Commissioner Worthley discussed how the Alta Irrigation District was hoping to create a sub basin and had a hydrological study scheduled for December 7, 2014, and commented on creating a sub basin by separate entities, and developing a plan of action.

Commissioner Mederos asked Tulare Irrigation District (TID) what the district was doing, who would take the lead, whether there was new implementation on the new bill and financing alternatives.

Beth Holmes, Senior Administrator for the Tulare Irrigation District (TID) commented that TID joined with the City of Tulare and bought 160 acres and put in a sinking basin due to the current groundwater situation two years ago, and stated TID was supportive of Prop 1 however, did not have any information on who would take the lead.

The Commissioners discussed the collaborated and conservation efforts needed by the irrigation districts to be leaders as they had water rights, contacts, information, and the skills set, and how the farming community did not want to pay for water but was accepting of regulation.

Commissioner Worthley discussed Alta Irrigation Districts efforts in positioning themselves ahead of the law, and their investment of significant funds for recharge basins.

Commissioner Ishida stated next Monday was the Tulare County Water Commission meeting, and discussed their efforts to schedule a joint water commission meeting with Kings County, and the vision for a basin and sub basins formed by JPA with delegated authority to the water districts as they had the expertise to handle water issues.

The Commission discussed the structure, obligation, and plans for sub basins, the boundary drawing process, governance of construction, and the planning process that is transparent with the focus on water (the need for water to preserve agricultural land).

Chair Worthley requested that EO Giuliani review recently passed Prop 1, Legislation of Groundwater, and the responsibility of LAFCO.

Commissioner Allen requested that EO Giuliani provide a status report of agricultural preservation policies in relation to Urban Area Boundaries and Spheres of Influence.

EO Giuliani stated he would invite the Cities of Visalia and Tulare staff to talk about their recently adopted agricultural mitigation policies.

Commissioner Ishida noted that the County General Plan directs growth to the cities and unincorporated communities.

#### 2. The Sphere, October 2014 Issue

EO Giuliani highlighted the cover article from The Sphere welcoming Tehama LAFCO to the commission.

Commissioner Allen indicated that all counties were now a part of CALAFCO.

#### 3. Request from LAFCO for items to be set for future agendas

Chair Worthley stated it would be worthwhile to have the cities with new general plans come to a meeting and address their plans.

EO Giuliani stated the cities might be available for the December meeting.

#### IX. Setting Time and Place of Next Meeting

The next meeting will be Wednesday, December 3, 2014. The meeting will be held in the Board of Supervisors Chambers in the County Administration Building.

#### XI. Adjournment

Local Agency Formation Commissions (LAFCOs) were established in each California county with the purpose of discouraging urban sprawl, preserving open-space and prime agricultural lands, efficiently providing governmental services to the residents of their respective counties, and encouraging the orderly formation and development of local agencies (i.e. cities and special districts) based on local conditions and circumstances. To help the Commission accomplish its propose, the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Reorganization Act of 2000 (Act) establishes procedures for local government changes of organization that are subject to commission review and approval such as annexations to a city or special district, city incorporation, district formation and consolidation of districts. A series of maps, graphs and tables are presented each December, which track changes within several categories under the purview of the Commission. These maps not only provide the Commission insight into future issues, challenges, and opportunities that could arise during consideration of future proposals, but they also serve as a gauge of the Commission's progress in accomplishing their purpose. The following is a summary of the materials contained in this presentation.

#### Figure 1 (LAFCO Activity Overview)

During the calendar year 2014, Tulare County LAFCO approved 17 proposals:

- Adoption of the City of Porterville Municipal Service Review Update
- City of Porterville Sphere of Influence (SOI) Update, LAFCO Case 1507
- City of Lindsay SOI Amendment, LAFCO Case 1502
- Annexation to the City of Lindsay, LAFCO Case 1503-L-49
- Annexation to the City of Lindsay, LAFCO Case 1504-L-50
- ESAs 2014-01 (Orosi PUD/Moreno) and 2014-03 (Poplar CSD/Walker)

- Annexation to the City of Visalia, Case 1505-V-446
- Tulare County Resource Conservation District SOI Update, LAFCO Case 1506
- ESAs 2014-04, -05, -06 and -07 (City of Porterville)
- Annexation to Orosi Public Utility District, Case 1508
- ESAs 2014-08, -09, -10 and -11 (City of Porterville)

This map provides an overview of where this activity took place.

**Tables 1 (Cities) and Table 2 (Special Districts)** correspond to Figure 1. The tables summarize city and special district growth in terms of total acreage and square mileage over the period 1/1/1980 to 1/1/2015. Cities and special districts that annexed territory into their jurisdictional boundaries during 2014 are highlighted in blue, while cities and districts that simply extended services to an area outside of their jurisdictional boundaries through an Extraterritorial Service Agreement (ESA) are highlighted in green.

Note: Only districts that provide an urban level of service appear on Table 2. Growth of these districts, in terms of acreage and square mileage, is a dependable indicator of pressure on open space and agricultural land as well as demand for urban services and space. There were ten extraterritorial service agreements approved in 2014. Eight of which were extended by the City of Porterville.

The County's four most populace cities experienced the largest total acreage increase and highest square mileage growth rate from 1/1/1980 to 1/1/2014. The special districts listed have experienced little growth over the last 34 years. Eight special districts: Earlimart PUD, Ivanhoe PUD, Poplar PUD, Ivanhoe Irrigation District, Lindmore Irrigation District, Pixley Irrigation District, Lower Tule River Irrigation District and Orosi PUD have annexed or detached territory, one district, Alpaugh CSD has been formed and one district, Tulare County Waterworks District #1 has been dissolved over the last 5 years. Generally, Tulare County special districts lack the financial resources and adequate infrastructure to support additional growth of any type. Table 2 indicates that districts containing the most populated unincorporated communities within their jurisdictional boundaries have experienced the largest gain in total acreage and largest percentage increase in square mileage area; however, most of that growth occurred from 1980 to 2000.

**Table 3** also corresponds to Figure 1. The table provides the total amount of acreage annexed each year and further divides the total into developed acres, undeveloped acres and road right-of-way (ROW) in terms of acres. The total amount of proposals considered by the Commission each year is also provided, as well as annexation proposals 300 ac in size or larger. In 2014 no single annexations occurred that were 300 ac or larger.

#### City Maps

Individual maps of the County's (8) cities are included with Figure 2-10.

#### Municipal Service Reviews

A city or special district SOI outlines where a city/special district will presumably grow over the next 20 years. In order to accurately assess a local agencies growth over this period of time, a SOI must be based on the findings and determinations contained in each agency's Municipal Service Review (MSR).

A MSR is prepared by LAFCO and updated every 5 years or as needed. The document reviews all municipal services provided by a particular agency and determinations must be made with respect to the following factors:

- (1) Growth and population projections for the affected area.
- (2) The location and characteristics of any disadvantaged unincorporated communities within or contiguous to the sphere of influence.
- (3) Present and planned capacity of public facilities and adequacy of public services, including infrastructure needs or deficiencies including needs or deficiencies related to sewers, municipal and industrial water, and structural fire protection in any disadvantaged unincorporated communities within or contiguous to the sphere of influence.
- (4) Financial ability of agencies to provide services.
- (5) Status of, and opportunities for, shared facilities.
- (6) Accountability for community service needs, including governmental structure and operational efficiencies.
- (7) Any other matter related to effective or efficient service delivery, as required by commission policy.

#### Figure 11 (Prime Agricultural Soils)

This map shows the five classes of soils identified by the USDA Soil Survey of Tulare County and their location throughout the County. Class 1 and 2 are identified as prime agricultural soils, all other classes are considered non-prime. Visalia and Tulare, the county's fastest growing cities in terms of total acreage annexed, are predominately surrounded by Class 1 and 2 soils. This indicates that a large portion of prime agricultural land will inevitably be converted to urban uses. In order to curb the loss of prime agricultural land, the Commission could explore the possibility of preparing an agricultural mitigation policy similar to that of other LAFCO's in the State.

**Table 4** – This table corresponds to Figure 11. The table shows the loss of prime agricultural soils from 1/1/1980 to 1/1/2014, both in terms of total acreage and percentage of square mileage. The table also contains a pie chart illustrating the proportion each soil class represents of all soil within Tulare County.

#### Figure 12 (Williamson Act Land)

In order for land to be considered prime agricultural land, it must meet one of five requirements listed under GC 56064; a USDA 1 or 2 soil classification is listed as a requirement. While land under Williamson Act contract isn't specifically defined as prime under Code, it can be an indicator of the presence of other qualifications for prime land. Also, the locations of contracts with notices of non-renewal may indicate future growth pressure in the area.

#### Figure 13 (Lands Owned by Government Entities)

This map identifies lands owned by the federal, state, county, city, district (all types of districts including special districts and school districts) governments. The map also includes land under trust for the purpose of open-space conservancy.

#### Figure 14 (Dairy Land)

Dairy land would qualify as prime under the economic qualifications outlined in GC 56064 (e). The location of dairy land may also show restrictions to future city/district growth.

**Table 5 –** For each of the last six years (2008-2014), this table shows total acreage annexed each year, the amount of acres pre-zoned residential, commercial, industrial, and institutional, and the percentage of the total acres annexed each land-use category represents.

#### Residential

As the figures indicate, at the height of the housing bubble in 2006 annexations intended to accommodate residential development accounted for almost 75% of all acres annexed. In 2014 one annexation occurred in this category.

#### Commercial

Commercial annexations saw modest spikes in 2007 (47% of total). Total commercial acres annexed between 2007 and 2013 were minimal with 77% of total commercial acreage annexed in 2007. In 2014 no annexations occurred in this category.

#### <u>Industrial</u>

2007 and 2011 experienced spikes in industrial annexations; however, these were the result of a single annexation in each year. All industrial sites annexed between 2006 and 2007 remain undeveloped; a fact that will figure prominently as the Commission looks to establish a commercial/industrial land demand methodology. In 2014 no annexations occurred in this category.

#### Institutional

This type of use includes sites slated for the development of parks, accommodation of city municipal service facilities, road improvements or construction, etc. Annexation rates for this type of use remained steady between 2006 and 2010. In 2014 no annexations occurred in this category. Visalia annexed 42 ac of land designated for conservation.

#### **Action and Report Summary**

Staff has provided a summary of activity by the Commission for the 2014 calendar year. Listed below are all the actions taken by the Commission and the special reports given to the Commission by staff. The January, May, July and September meetings were cancelled.

#### **FEBURARY**

#### Adoption of Amended LAFCO Policy A-5 (Commission Meetings and Hearings)

The Commission adopted Rosenberg's Rules of Order for the conduct of Commission meetings and amend an affirmative vote by the Commission from a majority present to a majority of the full membership.

#### **Approved Fee Reduction Request for Vandalia Water District**

The Commission approved a fee reduction request from the Vandalia Water District to \$1,500 for a potential annexation and SOI amendment.

#### **County Island Annexation Policy Update**

An inventory and maps of developed County islands were reviewed with the Commission. Also included in the report is how varying definitions of substantially surrounded affect the quantity and location of islands.

#### **Selection Process for Public Member**

The process and timeline for the selection of the public member was reviewed with the Commission.

#### <u>MARCH</u>

#### **Public Member Selection Committee**

Members Worthley and Hamilton were selected to review applications and make a recommendation for the public member position.

### Draft Amendment to Policy C-2.9 (Waiver of Public Notice & Hearing) and Policy B-2 (Processing Fees)

The draft amended policy was reviewed with the Commission. The proposed amended policy would reduce fees for changes of organization that qualify for a waiver of public notice and hearing. The requirements for what types of changes of organization that qualify for the waiver were also proposed to be amended to add flexibility.

#### **APRIL**

#### 2014/15 Preliminary Budget and Work Program

Staff reviewed the proposed preliminary budget and work program which the Commission approved with the use of \$50,000 from the reserve account to help offset city/county contributions.

#### **Public Member Selection**

Four applications were reviewed by the Public Member Selection Committee. The Committee made a recommendation to the Commission that Julie Allen continue as the public member. The Commission reappointed Julie Allen as the Public Member.

## Amendment to Policy C-2.9 (Waiver of Public Notice & Hearing) and Policy B-2 (Processing Fees)

The Commission approved the amended policy, reducing fees for changes of organization that qualify for a waiver of public notice and hearing and amending the requirements for what types of changes of organization that would qualify for the waiver.

#### **JUNE**

#### 2014/2015 Final Budget and Work Program

The Commission adopted the final budget and work program, for the fiscal year 2014/15, using , \$50,000 of reserve funds to offset the contribution from the County's eight cities and Tulare County.

#### **AUGUST**

#### City of Lindsay SOI Amendment, LAFCO Case 1502

The Commission approved a SOI amendment for about 17 acres of land to accommodate the proposed annexation of the Lindsay High School located at the northwest corner of Strathmore Ave and Tulare Road.

#### Annexation to the City of Lindsay, LAFCO Case 1503-L-49

The Commission approved the annexation of 43 acres of land (Lindsay High School) to the City of Lindsay located at the northwest corner of Strathmore Ave and Tulare Road and the detachment of the same area from County Service Area #1.

#### Annexation to the City of Lindsay, LAFCO Case 1504-L-50

The Commission approved the annexation of 40 acres of land (Roosevelt Elementary School and adjoining land) and the detachment from County Service Area #1. The site is located on the north side of Hickory Street (Avenue 236) between Sequoia Ave (Road 214) and Parkside Ave (Road 216).

#### Designation of Voting Delegate and Alternate for the CALAFCO Business Meeting

The Commission designated Member Allen as the voting delegate and EO Giuliani as the alternate for the CALAFCO Annual Conference.

#### **Draft Amendment to Policy C-6 (Extraterritorial Service Agreements)**

The draft amended policy was reviewed with the Commission. The proposed policy would streamline the ESA review process for requests that are inside and outside agency spheres of influence. Delegated authority would be given to the EO for requests involving existing development and public notice would be removed for requests that would be heard by the Commission.

#### ESAs 2014-01 (Orosi PUD/Moreno) and 2014-03 (Poplar CSD/Walker)

ESAs approved by the EO were reviewed with the Commission. The ESA for Orosi PUD was for the provision of water, sewer and street lighting to one developing commercial parcel that would later be annexed. The second ESA was for Poplar CSD for the provision of water and sewer service for three residences on one parcel.

#### 2013/14 Grand Jury Report

The Special District section from the 2013/2014 Grand Jury Report was provided to the commission. The Delta Vector Control District and the Tulare County Flood Control District were reviewed.

#### **OCTOBER**

#### City of Porterville Municipal Service Review Update

The Commission adopted the City of Porterville Municipal Service Review Update.

#### City of Porterville Sphere of Influence Update, LAFCO Case 1507

The Commission approved the proposed Sphere of Influence update for the City of Porterville as proposed by the City with the addition of an identified community of interest (the remainder of the Porter Vista PUD that wasn't already included in the SOI).

#### Annexation to the City of Visalia, Case 1505-V-446

The Commission approved the annexation of 135 acres of land located on the east side of Dinuba Boulevard between Shannon Parkway and the St. John's River to the City of Visalia and the detachment of the same area from CSA #1. The subject site included 93 acres designated for low density residential and 42 acres for conservation.

#### Tulare County Resource Conservation District SOI Update, LAFCO Case 1506

The commission approved the proposed Sphere of Influence Update for the Tulare County Resource Conservation District (TCRCD). The TCRCD is wholly located within Tulare County. The SOI update would allow TCRCD to annex land in Tulare County that is planned to be detached from Sierra RCD.

#### **Amendment to Policy C-6 (Extraterritorial Service Agreements)**

The Commission approved the proposed amended policy to streamline the ESA review process.

#### **Draft Amendment to Policy B-2 (Processing Fees)**

Staff presented a proposal to amend the fee for special district applications to activate latent powers recommending that the fee be separated from the change of organization fee (\$3,476) and be set at \$500 plus any additional costs beyond \$500.

#### ESAs 2014-04, -05, -06 and -07 (City of Porterville)

The Executive Officer reviewed the approval of four ESAs between the City of Porterville and four property owners for the provision of domestic water to four existing single-family residences.

#### November

#### Annexation to Orosi Public Utility District, Case 1508

The Commission approved the annexation of 1 acre of land for commercial use to the Orosi PUD.

#### Amendment to Policy B-2 (Processing Fees)

The Commission approved the amendment to Policy B-2, setting the processing cost of activating a latent power at \$500 plus any additional costs beyond \$500.

#### 2015 Proposal Deadline and Meeting Schedule

The Commission approved the 2015 proposal deadline and meeting schedule.

#### Williamson Act Contract Determination Process

A summary of the law and processes and LAFCO responsibilities regarding Williamons Act protests and the annexation of land under Williamson Act contract was reviewed with the Commission.

#### ESAs 2014-08, -09, -10 and -11 (City of Porterville)

The approval of four ESAs between the City of Porterville and three property owners and a mutual water company for the provision of domestic water was reviewed with the Commission.

## **Background**

Government Code section 56375.3 authorizes LAFCOs to waive protest procedures for the annexation of county islands that are surrounded or "substantially" surrounded by a city (along with other specific requirements such as being developed or developing). Currently, Policy C-9 defines "substantially surrounded" as 65%.

### **Discussion**

The City of Porterville has requested (letter attached) that the Commission amend its definition of substantially surrounded from 65% to 51%. Changing the definition from 65% to 51% would cause the addition of 13 new islands and the expansion of 4 existing islands to qualify for the stream-lined island annexation provisions (Table 1). Also, attached are tables and maps showing all of the existing and potential new islands.

LAFCOs across the state have varying or no definition of "substantially surrounded". A poll was conducted regarding how other LAFCOs define substantially surrounded:

50%+: Orange

52%: San Bernardino

66.7%: Alameda, Napa, San Joaquin

75%: Butte, Fresno, Placer, Santa Cruz, Sonoma

Case by case or undefined: Contra Costa, El Dorado, Kern, Los Angeles, Marin, Monterey, Nevada, Riverside, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, Shasta, Stanislaus, Yolo

Listed below is existing policy:

- I. There are two ways to define the term 'substantially surrounded':
  - (a) First is the percentage method. In this context, the terms "substantially surrounded" shall mean that the contiguous territory subject to an AB 1555 annexation must be surrounded by at least sixty five percent (65%) by that city and a county boundary.
  - (b) Second, an island of unincorporated territory may also be determined to be "substantially surrounded" if that island is surrounded by city limits comprising less than sixty-five percent (65%) AND if the remaining side is comprised of a natural or man-made barrier, including such features as: a river, an irrigation canal, a railway or a divided highway.

If the Commission were to amend policy to change the definition to 51%, staff would recommend the following edits:

- "65%" in subsection (a) would be changed to "51%".
- Remove subsection (b) as it would no longer be necessary.

The City Council of the City of Porterville would like to request that the Tulare LAFCo review and amend Policy C-9, Section 9.3 Interpretation of AB 1555- Island Annexation Policy. As you are aware, the City of Porterville has uniquely convoluted boundaries. As such, our municipality finds itself with a series of developed areas that are surrounded more than 50% by the city limits, but not all are 65% surrounded. The City Council would appreciate LAFCo's consideration of an adjustment of the "substantially surrounded" threshold, from 65% surrounded to 51% surrounded, to allow annexation of islands per the provisions of Policy C-9. We anticipate that this amendment to LAFCo's policy would result in a simplified annexation process for multiple developed, unincorporated communities adjacent to the city limits, as identified in the enclosed figure.

We look forward to attending a future meeting where Tulare LAFCo would consider this policy amendment.
